Leanne Ford took the interior design world by storm and made a name for herself with a now-famous 1907 schoolhouse renovation in Pittsburgh, her hometown. The home which is referred to as The Schoolhouse Project was featured in *Country Living Magazine*, and helped cement her career. Since then, Ford, whose designs are best described as modern, yet lived-in, continues to build a following with her signature "white on white" aesthetic. She leads design projects in Pennsylvania, New York, and Los Angeles and is a published author and HGTV staple on top of it all.

In our celebrity interview, Leanne Ford gives us valuable interior design advice and insight into her upcoming projects.

In a recent <u>celebrity interview</u> with <u>CupidsPulse.com</u>, Ford gives interior design advice and discusses her busy schedule full of new projects. She even gets personal and reveals some design details in her child's nursery.

The house and specifically the bathroom, that solidified Leanne Ford's reputation was The Schoolhouse Project. This project recognized her white and minimalist aesthetic, as the walls of the main living area were painted white, but the floor was left black for the perfect contrasting touch. In the bathroom, she knocked out the crawl space to create room for the bathtub. Though Ford's style was unique and grabbed the attention of the design world, when asked about the biggest risk she's ever taken, this was not one she would count in that category. "Honestly, everything is a risk in some form," the designer says. "If you're not making yourself nervous, you aren't doing anything special."

In addition to the time she spends on interior design projects, Ford and her brother Steve can be seen renovating old homes on their HGTV hit show, *Restored By The Fords* which is slated to come back for Season 3 early next year. She also recently appeared on *A Very Brady Renovation* and the new competition show, *Rock The Block*.

On A Very Brady Renovation, which premiered September 9th, the

six surviving members of *The Brady Bunch* cast came together with current HGTV stars to renovate the San Fernando Valley house used in exterior shots on the series. Ford says, "We just knew we had to get it right…we were not accepting anything less than perfect on that place." As for *Rock The Block*, which premieres on October 21st, four of HGTV's brightest stars, including Leanne Ford, square off in a home renovation showdown. Ironically, Ford admits that she's "the least competitive person, probably, like ever." However, she did mention that there is a healthy competition among the other women on the show.

Although she is kept extremely busy on professional projects, Ford and her husband are focused on their family. In March they welcomed their first daughter, Ever Allen Ford. When asked if there was anything special about the baby's nursery design, Ford says that she didn't have a pre-determined vision. However, she tells us that the baby has a "Love Wall," going on to explain that this is a wall of "love letters and sweet things" that she and her husband have given to each other over the years.

Design ideas like sentimental additions to her daughter's nursery seem to come naturally for the HGTV reality star. However, to some couples, a redesign could destroy a marriage or relationship. When it comes to working through how your home will look when you are a couple, Ford gives us some healthy <u>relationship advice</u>, explaining how two people can come to an agreement on differing design opinions and the risks of making a big change in your home. She says compromise is the best way to keep the peace at home. It sounds like picking your battle is important. To reduce nerves when it comes to a big home renovation she says, "It doesn't mean that everything has to go away...if you want to do it, you're going to love it!" Hollywood certainly has its share of dramatic endings – relationship endings, that is. Stars like Laurence Fishburne, Fergie, Chris Pratt, Jennifer Hudson, and Danica Patrick, to name a few, were invested in a long-term <u>celebrity</u> <u>relationship</u> and either personally or professionally called it quits. But what happens when a couple's livelihood relies on maintaining a relationship after the marriage is over?

Christina and Tarek El Moussa can relate. After becoming household names as co-hosts of HGTV's hit reality TV show *Flip* or *Flop*, they publicly announced their <u>celebrity divorce</u> just over a year ago. Despite moving on in their personal lives, both are committed to working together to make their successful business grow.

It's not uncommon for former partners to maintain a business relationship. There are an estimated <u>3.3 million businesses</u> in the U.S. that are jointly owned by spouses. In some cases, a

partner buys out the remaining portion of the business. But in a growing number of cases, the former married couple opt to remain invested in the business long after the divorce is final.

"I worked with one business where, actually, [the ex-spouses] were better business partners and got along better after the divorce and stayed together within the business for a while," says Dann Van Der Vliet, executive director of the Smith Family Business Initiative at the Samuel Curtis Johnson Graduate School of Management at Cornell University. Van Der Vliet believes that, when the divorce relieves the anxiety in a relationship, the partners can focus on the strengths they contribute to the business.

I talked with Christina and Tarek about their transition from a blended life to one that is now exclusively professional. They shared five rules they follow to maintain a positive and supportive professional relationship, even though they now lead separate personal lives:

1. Be professional: Part of their success derives from their ability to separate professional obligations from personal responsibilities. "We believe in this company, and that means keeping our personal lives separate," Tarek explains. "When we're on set, it's like a different life than what we live outside of the set. When we're doing our job, we're doing our job."

2. Focus on the ultimate goal: Whether it's personal or

business, staying focused on your goals can help minimize distractions. "Every day that we film, I remember why I'm there," says Tarek. He says his priority is to support his kids and family. "Second, I remember how I worked my entire life to build this thing. I don't want to throw it away because of a divorce. We are good at what we do," he adds. "We love flipping houses, and we enjoy delivering a great TV show that helps change people's lives."

3. Put kids first: Tarek and Christina understand that it is in everyone's best interest to get along. "Children come first, and that means doing things that are best for them," says Christina. "In our children's case, it was in their best interest to do things together." Often that decision requires some sacrifice and adjustments on the parent's part.

4. Don't sweat the small stuff: When tensions are high, it seems everything is a big deal. Immediately after a divorce, no matter how amicable, there is going to be a transition period. "Take time apart in all areas to better understand what you want," says <u>Kate Taylor.</u> "As you redefine your relationship, you should draw clear lines around your roles and responsibilities at work."

Christina quickly discovered that not everything is worth fighting about. "When you're not with that person, you're not entitled to have those disagreements anymore," she shares. "When Tarek and I first separated, if there was a disagreement, it was important that we walk away from it." When disagreements happen, her rule is: Don't react, because that is the moment when you need to think more clearly.

5. Keep it fun: Tarek and Christina make sure to contribute to a positive work environment. Their professionalism means everyone feels happy and comfortable when they are at work.

"We have a great crew," says Christina. "We've been friends with all of them for a long time. Because of that, it makes everything much easier because it's such a great workplace."

There are those who are skeptical that this type of relationship can work, but Christina is unfazed by the criticism. "Business is what we've always done best together. Tarek and I both agree that we work great together regardless of whether or not we are married," she explains. "We make a great co-parenting team as well. There is nothing I would have done differently."

There were value-increasing choices that could not be completed simply due to time, so it definitely required strategic thinking." Despite her prowess in design, she was unfortunately sent home on Sunday night's episode.

As the owner of Christy B. Designs, she has years of experience in interior design, which helped her make quick and efficient decisions on the show. "From the time I was little, I was always looking around me and visualizing how I would improve spaces – from my room to my treehouse. I even had a renovation laid out in my head for the barn on our family farm!"

Though it is sad that she was ousted on *Brother vs. Brother*, the talented designer now has more time to focus on her personal life. Biebrich is tapping even further into her love for design with her upcoming wedding – and it hasn't been as easy as one would expect. "People think that, because of my line of work, I would be like a fish in water with wedding planning – not so!" she says with a laugh. "I've been happy to have others helping me through this process because it's very overwhelming. It's how I imagine people must feel when they come to me with a renovation or redesign project – they're out of their element, and they need me to walk them through the process, to make it easy, make it fun and make their vision come to life." And, of course, the West Hollywood native is implementing her design aesthetic into her big day. "I love Art Deco, and we have several subtle hints to that style in our décor," says Biebrich. "Our centerpieces are very sculptural and architectural, and I like that they feel more like modern art than a bouquet of flowers. My wedding dress and my bridesmaids' dresses are very simple, elegant and contemporary. There's not a lot of frills, and I like it that way."

Most importantly, Biebrich's fiancé has been helping her throughout the planning process. She even admits that he has the stronger opinions and vision on the ceremony – a real role reversal. Then again, they've always had an interesting relationship. "We met on Match.com, but it wasn't your typical online dating story," she shares. "I wrote him a critique of his profile because I thought he had the worst headline I had ever seen. Remarkably, his ego was not bruised, and he didn't care what I wrote. He thought I was cute and asked me out! He caught me off guard; I said yes; and we started seeing each other."

Biebrich credits her fiancé's dependability, kindness and good heart for their successful relationship. "We get along so well because we are very silly," she says. "Laughter is the secret to a healthy everything! Neither of us take ourselves very seriously, so there's no butting heads or arguing. And the biggest thing is that we don't bring our work problems home with us or take our frustrations out on each other. We remain grateful, appreciative and respectful of each other and try not to take each other for granted."

"And I realized that there was opportunity to share the things I loved with the world."

Harris is the quintessential busy bee, and she puts all of the energy her petite frame has into everything she does. Driven by her zeal for design and antiquities, she decided to launch her online shop with her closest friends, Tori Wesszer and Alyssa Dennis. *The Bachelorette* star is not only the face of the brand but also helps search for everything you see on the site. The website offers one-of-a-kind items from a variety of Canadian and American antique dealers that adhere to the company slogan of "redefining the way consumers view and buy vintage and antique home décor across North America." Harris is excited to work with her friends and the rest of her team, who she notes "is incredible!"

The inspiration for Charlie Ford Vintage came from a mixture of her live-in boyfriend Justin wondering what they were to do with the multitude of early 1900s apple boxes that Harris bought last year and repeated questions on her blog of, "Oh my gosh, where did you find that piece?" The brunette realized that saying she found an item in Vancouver didn't help someone in Idaho. She quickly decided she should offer the items she found online for others to buy. And with that, Charlie Ford Vintage (named after Wesszer's one-year-old son) was born.

But this isn't any regular online antique store. "Essentially, what I'm doing is personal shopping for you," Harris notes. "I go out, find the items and post them online, and then, our vendors just take a commission. We aren't marking things up; we're negotiating to make sure we get the best price." In the future, she and her team plan to allow for client requests. "If there is something particular you are looking for, like an old cookie jar or a piece of art, we'll find it. We're out there all the time, in the trenches, searching for antiques that our customers want."

Harris certainly has her own sense of style and design. Her favorite piece is a blue, vintage buoy from the early 1900s that she bought while in Paella, Maui and made a part of a nautical vignette in her living room. When it comes to decorating and using antiquated items, she is a pro – and not just for women's spaces but for men too. "I think the great thing about vintage that a lot of girls don't realize is that guys love it too. If you put an old box for ammo on your coffee or side table, guys think it's awesome, and women love the connection and history. You really can't go wrong," she observes. "I think guys want the same thing girls do: something that's unique, something different. When you're decorating as a new couple or with a guy in mind, going vintage is great."

The former bachelorette has not only found love with antiques but also in her current relationship. Harris met Justin at a bar, and they immediately hit it off. "He was just gorgeous," she gushes. "He was very nice too. I was dating someone awful at the time and thought, 'You know, I'm gonna give this guy a try.' The rest is history."

"I will never let him go," she adds.

Through heartache, she learned what it takes to be happy in a relationship: "I believe that if you can't be happy with yourself first, you're not gonna be happy in a relationship. You can't beat yourself up too much, and you can't force something to happen. If it doesn't feel right, just let it go. Remember that there are plenty of fish in the sea and that you only live once." Wise words that the current bachelorette, Desiree Hartsock, should take note of.
